
Of course, our main purpose in being in Portugal these next few months is to learn Portuguese. Our

Key to Success: Good Mentors

By most accounts, we are a well-prepared mission team. We each have undergraduate degrees from Christian universities. Among us, we have accumulated more than 230 hours of graduate level Bible and ministry courses. As a team, we completed six workshops with Missions Resource Network designed to prepare missionaries for the field, as well as a “strategy lab” hosted by Kairos Church Planting. With our families combined, we have a cumulative 9 years experience in inner city ministry, 4 years experience in vocational ministry in Japan, 3 years experience in rural church work, and three missionary kids.

On the other hand, we are young and inexperienced. Simply put, we’re all between 26 and 37 years old and none of us have ever planted a new church in any context.

We believe we can compensate for this lack of experience by surrounding ourselves with experienced mentors who will coach us as we dive into this new mission work. We praise God for our professors and for the former and current missionaries

at MRN and Kairos that have helped equip us for this work. Each adult on our team has also chosen an experienced missionary to be a personal mentor – someone with whom he/she will communicate regularly about the work and the health of his/her family on the field. Our team has also chosen a couple, Rick and Marinda Trull, who coach us in our preparation, strategy, and progress in our work.

Rick and Marinda ministered in Meru, Kenya for 10 years. Rick is now the director of the Missions Program at Faulkner University and an elder at the Fort Deposit Church of Christ. Marinda is a practicing nurse.

In July, Rick and Marinda visited us for the first time ‘on the field’ here in Portugal. Their visit was a great source of encouragement for us, and we talked about our evolving strategy, our progress in language learning, and maintaining healthy family and team relationships on the field. We thank God that our ‘team’ includes Christians like Rick and Marinda who serve His mission by investing themselves in us.
